A helping hand

Dubai-based company heads to Afghanistan to help poverty-stricken residents.



As we go about our daily lives, with work problems to deal with and bills to pay, it is easy for many of us to forget about the plight of some of our close neighbours. While Dubai enjoys a buzzing atmosphere, endless entertainment options, clean facilities and first-class healthcare, in the war-torn capital of Afghanistan, Kabul, simple things such as basic medical equipment are often hard to come by, and many of those in need can go without these necessities.

However, there are those who are not ready to forget the plight of others. In order to show support and offer help to the people of this region, Dubai-based company RMSI recently headed to Kabul, where members of the team, including company CEO Rob Lamb, made a visit to the Indira Gandhi Children's Hospital. The team distributed toys and lifted the spirits of the scores of children who are currently in-patients at the facility, as well as distributing medical supplies, toys and financial aid to the patients and the hospital workers.

This was not the first venture in hostile territory for the RMSI team,

who, as a company, focus on bringing medical care and services into territories worldwide where war or conflict has created an unstable environment.

With the company headquarters in Dubai, RMSI has operations in countries across the entire Middle East and North Africa region, and it was during a routine operational visit that the trip to Indira Gandhi Children's Hospital was made.

While there are many people who would—quite understandably—hold some fears about entering hostile environments, it is companies and organisations such as RMSI whose hard work and dedication to the cause enables them to deliver important help to those residents who are living in these areas.
